## Year 3 & 4 Class



It has been another busy term in the Year 3/4 classroom. COVID was a disruption in the middle of this term, taking a couple of weeks for the class to get back to normal numbers. It was very impressive how well the students adjusted to normal school routines and expectations. In Science students have been learning about life cycles with Mrs Thorn, and we currently have 12 eggs in an incubator in the classroom that we are hoping will hatch in the coming week. Students have candled them, and we could possibly have a few chicks hatching soon, which the students are very excited about.

In writing we have been learning how to write descriptive and engaging narratives, with the assistance of our class novel "The World's Worst Pets" by David Walliams, to demonstrate how to engage readers through funny and interesting characters and storylines. Students have gone on to write their own narrative about a World's Worst Pet. Some of the students World's Worst Pets include Rubble the Rhino, Mark the Fighting Fish, Felly Smelly the Dog, Minnie the Very Naughty Monkey, Bicken the Bunny Chicken, and many more.







The Year 3/4 class is once again taking part in a STEM showcase along with three other schools from the Great Southern, which will be held in Term Three. This term students have been planning, designing and are currently in the stages of creating a STEM project for the question "What makes an environment sustainable?" The STEM project follows a structured design-thinking model where students learn to use critical and creative thinking skills, and work together as a team. The project ideas are developed completely by the students, and these include a bamboo playground, a musical bin with censored lids, a foldable bed and shelter for homeless people, as well as two underwater vacuums - one group has designed their vacuum so it is led by a drone flying above the water, the other group has designed their vacuum to look like a whale. Both vacuums aim to collect the rubbish in our oceans. Each prototype is

We have been learning a lot about how to better look after the planet, focusing on sustainability in our integrated HASS and Technologies unit this term. Students have been investigating the range of natural resources that the come from different environments, how they are used today, and identifying ways these resources can be used more sustainably. This integrated unit has been the focus of this year's STEM project for the Year 3/4 class, where students are required to work collaboratively to develop a prototype that aims to make the world more sustainable in some way.

The term has flown by, and I am sure everyone is looking forward to a well-earned break in a couple of weeks. We can't wait to see what the second half of the year will hold.


